My Dear Friends

Are you an anarchist? Am I? Increasingly I am beginning to think that we are all anarchists. An anarchist is one who is against the rule of law. But surely we can't be because we are all law abiding subjects. That is where the difficulty lies. The rule of law of which Kingdom is the issue. Is it the law of the United Kingdom or the law of the Kingdom of God?

Parliaments over the last half century have passed legislation contrary to God's word, and our Queen, who in the Coronation Oath promised to uphold God's law, has been obliged to break that oath and sign various Acts of Parliament which go against God's word. Just a few weeks ago Parliament put another nail in the coffin of the family which has been under attack from liberalisers for some time. Much of the 'politically correct' agenda is a deliberate attack on Biblical standards. It starts with the assumption that man is at the centre and that whatever he thinks is right for him is right. God's absolutes are discarded as ancient rubbish. We ignore God's laws, contradict and distort them and then we ask 'why does a loving God allow this to happen?' When we as a nation, more than aided and abetted by Acts of Parliament, have told God to get out of our national and individual lives we should not be surprised that God, respecting our wishes or instructions, does precisely that.

At one time we were a nation under God and the King and Prime Minister could call the nation to prayer but now such a call is regarded as inappropriate. At one time God answered the nation's prayers and more than once we have seen great deliverances but now we see violence, intimidation, undermining liberalisation and discord rife in the nation. And we wonder why. The answer is simple - we have turned our backs on God and his word and way for our lives and gone after the gods of our own devising.

As a nation we need to repent, Parliament needs to turn to God's law for guidance and we all need to seek God with all our heart. Only then will God forgive and heal our land. Christians must stand up, be counted and proclaim the Jesus way. It has happened before that Christians have been called anarchists. They were but only in regard to the laws passed which contravened God's laws. Perhaps it is time for Christians today to challenge the liberalising and man-centred laws and conventions which are being forced on this nation by those whose agenda is the ultimate anarchy - opposition to God.

God blesses those who follow his way. May he bless us.

A re-modelled Family Service

At St. Thomas's we have been looking at the format of our Family Services (I.e. the non-communion services we hold about once each month), and we have decided on some changes.

In future the Family Service will be held on the first Sunday of every month at 11.00 a.m. This will not be a communion service, but a service with plenty of variety which we hope will suit all ages from 0 - 100; not easy, but we are having a go! The main features of the service will be:-

- It will last less than an hour
- There will be hymns, short readings and prayers, and in most cases a short 'event' (probably some music, drama, poetry, etc.), and often a baptism
- The hymns will certainly be mostly ones you can already sing - or if they are new we can learn them together. We shall use mainly the ones that children are familiar with in school assemblies, and that most adults will remember from their younger days.
- There will be coffee and orange juice available after the service, so you can stay a while and chat.

All this is nothing very 'modern', and it is certainly not revolutionary, but we hope it will be a regular and pleasant occasion in which all ages will be brought together in an informal service of worship for all the family.

So if you haven't been to church recently (though many will remember our joint Christmas services and the Christingle services in recent years, which have been packed to the doors), how about joining us on the first Sunday of each month? Bring the kids (nobody minds if they shout a bit, and God certainly doesn't), bring grandma and grandad, bring Auntie Jane who is just visiting. And have a good sing, or just listen to the children having a good sing. And don't forget the coffee afterwards.

St. Thomas Clock Chimes

When you are on the Square you will probably have noticed that St. Thomas clock chimes have now been working properly for the last couple of months. The donations we received were enough to pay for the restoration of the striking and chiming mechanism (first installed in 1947, so it hasn't done badly) and also for a night-silencing system. It did take a while to get all the adjustments exactly right; the chiming system is very much 'intermediate technology', and a slight tweak of the cams at the winding drum end of the system can give the chimes a distinctly syncopated rhythm. We hope they now sound as they should.

In the Church Centre at the west end of the church we now have a beautifully calligraphed record of the donations which enabled us to have this work done listing, where appropriate those in whose memory donations were made.

Thanks to all who made this restoration possible.

St. Thomas Parish News - June 2002

Professional Tenor welcomed

St. Thomas Church was the venue for two wonderful concerts welcoming Wynford Evans, one of Britain's foremost tenors who has appeared with all major orchestras and choruses and toured throughout the country. He was invited by choirmaster/organist Glyn Hopkins who originally taught him at Dynevor School, Swansea. At the first concert he appeared with Brian Lancaster - bass, Adrian Self - organ and Arnside Choral Society in a programme of English church music which included Stainer's Crucifixion.

The second concert was in two parts with Glyn accompanying Wynford on the piano. The first half consisted Schumann's Dichterliebe and part two was the musical world of Wynford Evans and included songs from opera, musicals, Gilbert & Sullivan and popular ballads. Proceeds after the deduction of expenses were for the Restoration Fund.

Annual Church Meetings

At the Annual Vestry Meeting churchwardens John Ricketts and John Thorley were re-appointed. The Vicar thanked them for all their meticulous work and help over the past year. At the following Parochial Meeting reports were received from the Chairman the Rev. Gold Bar Presentation Congratulations to Mrs. Isobel Clark on being awarded a gold bar to her original gold badge for all her R.N.L.I. fundraising over the past 34 years. This is the highest award by the R.N.L.I. and was presented to Isobel by Richard Branson at the Barbican, London on May 15th. Mrs. Clark began organising the annual collections in 1968 with 25 boxes raising £59. She now has 75 boxes and 20 at various shops which raised £3,800 last year. Over the years she has also held annual coffee mornings at her home.

SAMS North West Area Day Conference

On Saturday May 11th a group of us went to the annual day conference in Bolton. As usual we had a very interesting and informative day listening to the experiences of South American Mission Society members working both in South America itself and in Europe too. We heard Bishop Maurice Sinclair (who preached at the Parish Communion at Heversham the following day) giving us a historical perspective on the work of SAMS from its beginnings in 1838, when it was very much European missionaries going out to evangelise indigenous people, to its present aim to have native S. Americans leading their own churches and indeed sending mission workers to Europe.

We heard from other speakers about projects in which they are involved:-

Felipe Yanez, a Chilean working with young people in Birmingham.

Daniel Zeidan, a Chilean working on a housing project for Pehuenche Indians in Chile.

Mike Dixie, an English student nurse who has taken part in The Latino Experience, a SAMS initiative to give young people in this country an opportunity to visit S. The new Citizens' Advice Bureau's Rural Telephone Helpline

Kendal & District CAP has recently launched a new telephone helpline to serve the rural communities around Kendal.

The aim of the service is to provide a quick and effective advice service for people living in rural communities especially those in Milnthorpe and its surrounding rural communities. If you live in this district, or have a postcode that starts with either LA5 or LA7 you can telephone the helpline on 08451 202 999 on Monday and Thursday between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. You can also leave a message at all other times and a CAB adviser will return your call.

Another alternative for people who have access to the Internet is to contact the Rural Advice Service on the Bureau's website at www.cabkendal.ndo.co.uk Kendal CAB has also set up a leaflet point, which can be located by the front door in Milnthorpe Library. The leaflet point holds a series of twenty-four very informative leaflets published by the Community Legal Services covering a variety of different problem areas from Wills & Probate, Personal Injury, Community care.

The Citizens Advice Bureau can advise on a wide range of subjects such as housing, consumer, welfare benefits, debt, family and personal issues as well as many more subjects. The Citizens Advice Bureau is an independent charity. We give free, confidential, impartial advice to everybody who needs it.

Milnthorpe Cemetery Lane

Flooding at the bottom of Cemetery Lane has been a problem apparently since 1906! However in recent years it has become a real nuisance often cutting off access to the cemetery to all pedestrians and some motor vehicles.

As is often the case with old boundaries and buildings ownership of the lane and hence responsibility for its maintenance is unclear. Despite this uncertainty and, as the lawyers say, 'without prejudice' the Parish Council has taken an initiative to investigate and hopefully overcome the problem. Initial indications are that the work done so far has been effective. If this is not so major new drainage work may be necessary.

The proposed new access to Dallam School off the Crooklands road would lead to a new drainage system in that area, comprehensively solving two village problems in one step. Until that time we keep our fingers crossed.
